Recycling Education

Why should we care?



According to the Center for Sustainable Behavior & Impact, "The success of recycling depends on the small, everyday actions of hundreds of millions of people across the country."


So why then don't we have a 100% recycling participation rate?

3 reasons: Convenience Barriers, Confidence Barriers, and System Barriers.

Most people are motivated to recycle because they want to protect the environment, to keep waste out of landfills and incinerators, because they see the local benefits, and importantly, because recycling is often tied to personal values.

But even with good intentions, barriers get in the way. For some, recycling is inconvenient or confusing. Others lack confidence — they're not sure what goes where, or whether their efforts make a difference. And when people don't see neighbors recycling, or they feel their town doesn't provide enough support, they hesitate to participate.

Funding recycling education & outreach to small, rural NH communities



NH Recycles took on this challenge with the support of an EPA Recycling Education & Outreach grant, which aimed to provide federal support to communities that historically have not received as much. This nationally competitive grant's goal is to increase education about community recycling programs and recyclable materials, thereby increasing collection rates and decreasing contamination in residential recycling programs.

NH Recycles wanted federal funds to benefit small, rural communities in New Hampshire that primarily have source separated recycling, where trash and recyclables must be brought to a transfer station and manually sorted by residents, not just large cities with curbside single stream programs.

Focus on Convenience









Our project, Recycle Right North Country, makes recycling more convenient by meeting residents where they are: in their homes, online, at community events and in community spaces, and of course, at transfer stations.

We made it simple by focusing on the most commonly accepted materials: cardboard, paper, glass, plastics, aluminum, and steel cans.

Though we do use social media, YouTube, and the NH Recycles website to share recycling education, we are also going old school with radio PSAs and newspaper articles. This summer, during the in-person phase of the project, we went even more analog when we hit the streets, going door to door to multi-unit housing and apartment complexes handing out recycling totes and answering questions, and showing up at the transfer station to "catch" and reward people for recycling right and dispelling more recycling myths.

To build confidence, we provide clear, practical education.

- Residents can see exactly what happens to their recyclables through videos that track items from their local North Country transfer station to the final destination be it a paper mill, glass aggregate processor, or metals recycler where the material will be recycled into a new product.
- Custom recycling magnets, handouts, and postcards that correlate to updated transfer station signage clearly show the recyclables accepted at individual municipal recycling programs, along with transfer station details.
- The Recycle Right Summit and Recycling Conference & Expo brings it all together offering hands-on workshops and presentations to reinforce learning and build pride in recycling.
